

TATTOOS

Over 32% of American adults have a tattoo. Approximately 25% of those wish they hadn't gotten it. A tattoo is meant to be permanent. The ink is placed beneath the surface of the skin, in the 2nd layer, the dermis, so it does not disappear with normal shedding of skin cells. But that makes the ink difficult to remove.

The size, color and location of your tattoo, as well as your skin color, will affect the outcome of a removal attempt. A common way to remove or lighten a tattoo is through laser treatment. Q-switched lasers emit a pulse of energy that breaks the tattoo ink into tiny Over several weeks, your body's pieces. immune system eliminates the ink particles. The procedure can be painful. Swelling, bleeding or blistering occur. Several treatments may be needed. Often it is not possible to remove all evidence of a tattoo.

At-home removal kits are not approved by the Food and Drug Administration. They have not been shown to be effective and may be harmful.
