### **Preventative Medicine** Marcia Cavanaugh **SUNBURN**

Too much exposure to ultraviolet light (UV) by the sun, tanning beds or sunlamps cause sunburn. Sunburn increases your risk of premature aging, precancerous skin lesions and skin cancer. Deep wrinkles, dry, rough skin, freckles, dark or discolored spots, fine red veins on cheeks, nose and ears are the results of photoaging caused by the sun.

Excessive sun exposure can cause melanoma. Sunburns in childhood or adolescence may increase the risk of melanoma.

If you notice: skin growth, a sore that bleeds easily, crusts over, heals and then reopens or a change in the look of a mole you should see your doctor.
